A letter from our Executive Director

NOVEMBER 13, 2018

Greetings,

As times change, it is important for us at Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County to find the right balance between developing new programs, and keeping traditional programs strong and vital. This year, we have worked hard to stay balanced as we added new programming in 4-H, nutrition, agriculture, and natural resources.

In 4-H, responding to a need to help today's youth forge a connection with the outdoors and nature, we started the "Survival Skills Challenge," a competitive program where teams of youth compete in outdoor skills such as shelter building, fire starting, kayaking, navigating, and wild edibles. We also had our first camping and kayak trip at Balsam Pond and we added programming for 4-Hers in cooking. But as we created these new programs, we also worked to keep our traditional 4-H programming strong in areas of livestock judging, County Fair, Shooting Sports, sewing and textiles and 4-H After-School.

In our Eat Smart New York Nutrition Program, we have added a new school-focused program and added more vegetable cooking programming for food pantries. We have also kept up other nutritional education, such as grocery store tours, that have been successful in the past.

In agriculture, the challenging dairy prices have made our traditional program support for dairy and field crop production more important than ever before, and to strengthen them we added a new position Farm Business Support Specialist. Nicole Tommell was hired to help farmers chart the best path forward for their businesses. We also added new programming to help farmers develop new income from their woodlots through maple, firewood, and even mushrooms.



Southern-tier Eat Smart New York

The Coordinated Approach to Child Health (CATCH) programming has been one of the biggest initiatives of Eat Smart New York this year. CATCH curriculum is based on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Coordinated School Health model. It combines ten components to interactively educate young people about, and provide support for, a healthier lifestyle through nutrition and physical activity.

This year two Southern Tier Eat Smart New York nutritionists attended training to become CATCH certified trainers themselves. This has allowed the team to lead their own CATCH trainings for schools. One such training was led at the Norwich City School District for two Chenango County schools. Throughout the training, many topics were covered including the rationale and need for improving children's health, an overview of the CATCH Program, and a component specific overview using the CATCH resource materials. They also discussed the strategic planning needed for successfully implementing and utilizing the CATCH Coordination Guide. This Guide is a tool that coordinates the efforts of key CATCH Team players, such as Principals and Administration, Classroom Teachers, Child Nutritionists, PE teachers, Parent Leaders, and Specialized and Support Staff.

Programming with school age children has been a large effort for Southern Tier Nutrition Educators. They are now attending ten different schools on a weekly or monthly basis conducting direct education during the day or in after school programs. Besides direct education in schools and the CATCH curriculum, Eat Smart New York continues education in other aspects of the community.





Above are pictures of Program Coordinator, Betty and a CATCH training from earlier this year, and the images on the right are from various programming done by our three educators, Whitney, Neisa, and Liz.

Over the year, ten food pantries have been attended on a monthly basis. There were also ten WIC clinics attended monthly and six to ten senior centers attended monthly. Besides attending organizations, the educators also attend wellness fairs and other community events, in the past year there have been six attended. ESNY's educator collaboration with other CCE programs in Chenango County has also been a large attribution this past year.

Along with the Wholesome Rx collaboration, there has also been cross program collaboration between ESNY and 4-H. Educators have joined together to deliver programming to youth at the New Berlin Library and the Rogers Center with complimentary programs. This collaboration has broaden the community reach of Cornell Cooperative Extension in Chenango County.

Central New York Dairy, Livestock, and Field Crops Team

Agriculture is an important industry in Chenango County. The dairy, livestock, and field crop industry represents about ninety percent of agricultural products sold. Because the land and climate in the region are naturally suited for dairy and field crop production the potential for increased agricultural production exists.

The Team Mission:

The Central New York Dairy, Livestock and Field Crops Team was formed to work with this important industry. The mission of this extension team is to provide high quality educational programs that address the needs of dairy, livestock and field crop producers in the eight county region. The team consists of specialists in the following areas of expertise: a Dairy Specialist Dave Balbian, a Livestock Specialist Ashley McFarland, a Field Crop Specialist Kevin Ganoe, and a recently added Farm Business Management Specialist Nicole Tommell.

2018 Programming:

In 2018, the team led the following programs in Chenango County: Field crop Management Program, a two day Feeder School, an Improved Forage Quality Meeting, a Corn Silage Pre Harvesting Meeting, and Pasture Walks.



Current Issues Addressed by the Team:

- Introduce the principles of Precision Feed Management to provide cows the necessary nutrients to maintain profitability and environmental sustainability
- Help farm operators improve cow comfort and health and increase labor efficiency through remodeling or building new dairy facilities.
- Bring to dairy producers the latest information regarding dairy nutrition.
- Assist crop producers with species selection and developing profitable crop rotations while emphasizing the use of Integrated Pest Management (IPM) techniques
- Provide training on nutrient management so producers make the best use of plant nutrients while protecting the environment.
- Managing the CNY Beef Feeder calf sale
- Assisting dairy farmers dealing with low milk prices
- Determining how to set farmland rental prices





Welcome Nicole Tommell

The 2018 year welcomed the addition of Nicole Tommell as the agricultural business management specialist on the Central New York Dairy, Livestock and Field Crops team. Nicole provides leadership for planning and developing programing that emphasizes business management and profitability. Nicole received her Bachelor of Technology degree from SUNY Cobleskill in Agricultural Business. She also holds a Masters in Agricultural Education from North Carolina State University. Before joining the team, Nicole was a Visiting Instructor at SUNY Cobleskill teaching courses ranging from agricultural business to animal science. She has also managed a diversified cattle operation she owns with her husband.

Her primary goal with the team is to provide business analysis, planning and development support for agricultural businesses in the region.

Agriculture, Grazing, and Ag Economic Development 2018

Advancing the agricultural industry in Chenango County is central to the mission of Cornell Cooperative Extension. Agriculture has been, and continues to be, the foundation of Chenango County's economy and of our quality of life. Healthy and productive farms of all types in our rolling hills provide beautiful views and define Chenango County's landscape; as well as being a tremendous economic engine. Agriculture provides the economic vitality that keeps the county's villages and townships prospering, and adds considerably to the county's tourism appeal. Our major agricultural initiatives at CCE include dairy farm, livestock and field crops support, farm consulting, marketing support, horticultural support, improved rotational grazing for dairy and livestock, and new and beginning farmer information and education.

Some of our Accomplishments in 2018:

- The SARE grant (Sustainable Agriculture and Education) has been completed this year. In 2016, six different farms that graze dairy cattle were involved in testing low cost and different methods of establishing pastures. The plots were again monitored in 2017 to ascertain the success of different seeding methods. Final results have been submitted in 2018, and a video was posted on YouTube detailing the results of this project. This SARE No-Till Re-Seeding Trial Video has gained 68 views on Facebook and Youtube in 2 months.
- Provided extensive information, education, and support to new and beginning farmers. For example, a successful small community of New Order Amish farmers has established businesses in Guilford, and are growing in size. As of the summer of 2018, there are eight Amish family farms and businesses in this community. Many other new and beginning farmers seek assistance from our office as well.
- Collaborated in several initiatives of the Cornell Small Farms Program: Beginning Farmer support, informational articles written for the Small Farms Quarterly, and input and development for the statewide Wholesale Marketing Curriculum.
- Collaboration in support of several county organizations: Commerce Chenango, the Agriculture Development Council, Ag and Farmland Protection Committee, Dairy Day, Farm Bureau, and the Chenango County Fair.
- CCE Chenango has a strong presence on YouTube, with many of our videos from past years on a variety of topics continuing to receive views and favorable comments, worldwide.
- Farm to Fork, a taste of Chenango was held for the third year in 2018, at the annual Chenango County Fair. This effort was spearheaded by CCE Communications staffer Ashley Russell. The event highlighted many different products grown in Chenango County for the public to see, learn about, and taste.
- Collaborating with Chenango County Farm Bureau, a very successful Animal Cruelty workshop was held at the Silo Restaurant in Greene. There were many law enforcement officers and town supervisors present; all who attended thought that this was a very valuable endeavor.
- A successful Dairy Day was held in June at the Chenango County Fairgrounds.
- A continued Ag exhibit at the Chenango County Historical Society's Loomis Barn.

Natural Resources and Horticulture

From outdoor opportunities involving mushrooms and maple syrup production, to challenges such as giant german wasps, sickly spruce trees, or troublesome ticks, our staff has provided assistance in the form of farm visits, personal office consultations, phone call support and group programs. Over the last year more than 180 people received one-on-one assistance from staffers, Ken Smith and Rich Taber.

A special focus in natural resources this year was due to a grant from the New York Farm Viability Institute, for which we produced nine videos on farmers and producing income from their woodlots. These videos have been viewed by more than 28,763 people on YouTube and Facebook.

This video series, called *Profit From Your Forest*, has also been shared across multiple different media sources. Cornell Small Farms and Association of Natural Resource Extension Professionals both did a feature on this video series in their newsletters, sharing these videos with their networks.

Blueberries are a great fit for hilly Chenango County. This year blueberries were an important part of our horticultural education efforts. Ranging in size from backyard blueberry patches of a few bushes to commercial blueberry plantations of thousands of blueberries.

We have assisted two commercial producers with pH and plant



evaluations, we have helped more than a dozen back vard blueberry growers balance their soils to produce blueberries. Beyond the berries, we have helped commercial growers with issues related to immigration and warehouses for crop storage. This rainy year we have helped home owners with plant fungus issues on everything from tomatoes, to lawns, to spruce trees.

Profit From Your Forest Video Series

The videos in the Profit From Your Forest series have featured the forest owners and their enterprises, including a Sawmill, local Maple Syrup businesses, and a forest lease contract. These business owners share with their viewers the advantages of their forest enterprises, their successes, and their struggles. Two of the videos feature Steve Childs, of the Cornell Maple Program, speaking about the important characteristics of a woodlot that create a successful maple syrup operation. In these videos, Childs walks through a woodlot pointing out the positives and negatives that he recognizes, demonstrating how a viewer could do the same in their own woodlot.

Right now the series features aspects of maple and sawmill businesses, and can be viewed on Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County's Facebook page or YouTube Channel. Over the final year of this grant, CCE Chenango plans to continue to help woodlot owners complete forest business plans. They also plan to add to this video series with mushroom and firewood business opportunities.

Master Gardener Volunteers

More than a dozen of the Chenango County Master Gardeners worked together to contribute over one hundred volunteer hours on seven different educational gardening projects.

Projects included: raised beds for the CCE headquarters, herb plants for the County Fair, demonstration gardens at Guernsey Library and CCE headquarters, community garden plants, and the community plant sale at Guernsey Library. All of this in addition to helping with plant and insect identification, general inquires, and other growing problems coming into the Master Gardener's Hotline.

Master Food Preserver Volunteers

In 2018, there were seven Master Food Preserver volunteers that provided 27 hours of volunteer service to educate and guide people in home food preservation and cooking. The Master Food Preserver program offered workshops in a variety of topics such as; Food Preservation Safety, Preserving Fresh Blueberries, Salsas and Sauces, Pressure Canning and Freezing Fresh Vegetables, Preserving Apples, Pressure Canning Meats, Ready to Eat Meals, and Preserving Holiday Gifts.

In addition to workshops, the Master Food Preservers gave a presentation on Food Preservation Safety at the Small Farm and Homestead show as well as a demonstration for Head start Families in Chenango County about dehydrating food at home. In 2019 the Master Food Preserver program hopes to provide more workshops to the community as well as engage in more community outreach.

Master Clothing & Textile Volunteers

The 4-H Master Clothing & Textile Volunteers led 4-H sewing camp again this past year and helped the 4-H'ers at Joann Fabric to get the material they need. As in prior years, these volunteers spent five days teaching six 4-Her's various sewing techniques and skills. They learned and improved their skills by making quilted bags, stuffed animals, t-shirt dresses, and tops. To the right are a couple images of our volunteers working closely with our 4-Her's. This year these volunteers donated over 20 hours of time to direct education in Chenango County!

Grow Cook Serve

2018 was the fourth year for the Grow Cook Serve program which endeavors to increase the capacity of food pantries and soup kitchens in Chenango County. Four participant volunteers have offered more than 120 hours of service by gleaning fresh produce, or growing vegetables for donation. Over 3,741 pounds of fresh produce was donated to 21 Food Pantries and Soup kitchens in Chenango County. Grow Cook Serve also started a collaboration with Nutrition Educator Elizabeth Coffey, of Eat Smart New York, to offer cooking workshops at Food Pantries. The goal of this collaboration is to ensure that produce donated to food pantries from Norwich Meadows Farms, and other local growers, is utilized by the clients of food pantries.

In addition, we have taught a total of five container garden workshops to 35 families at Head Start centers and Food Pantries. This program and its educators was also able to donate an additional 25 tomato transplants for people to plant in their own home gardens. Grow Cook Serve also taught two dehydrating workshops to 16 families from Head Start. Over the last four years, Grow Cook Serve has evolved to meet the needs of families in Chenango County and we are excited to see how that takes shape in 2019.











Wholesome Rx

Wholesome Rx is a six month program designed to help families adopt healthier eating habits by providing access to fresh fruits and vegetables. The Wholesome Wave organization, with the support of the Chobani Foundation, has partnered with Alexis Woodcock of Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County and the Healthcare team at UHS pediatrics to enroll 147 participants in the program.

Participants of the program must have children between the ages of 2 and 18 years old, qualify for SNAP, Medicaid, WIC, and/or free or reduced lunch and be at risk of diet-related disease. Once qualifying families enroll they get a Rewards card good for \$60.00 a month for fresh fruits and vegetables that can be used at Price Chopper, Tops, and Walmart. Funds are reloaded monthly as participants use them. In addition to the \$60.00 a month for fresh fruits and vegetables families are given the opportunity for comprehensive cooking and nutrition education offered by ESNY nutrition educator Elizabeth Coffey.

The goal of the program is to increase the affordability of fresh fruits and vegetables, by providing families with monetary incentives and nutrition education, in order to develop lifelong healthy eating habits.

Farm to Fork, a taste of Chenango

This year brought the third Farm to Fork, a taste of Chenango at the Chenango County Fair. This free event put local agriculture on display for fairgoers, featuring displays from Chenango County producers and businesses, all offering the public the opportunity to taste products and recipes created locally. While youth could sit to make their own butter or color a picture, parents and adults could enjoy live displays of culinary creation. With so much collaboration from local producers, 4-H youth, and local organizations, there was always something to learn or taste under the Farm to Fork tent.

This year's event enjoyed the return of seven producers and businesses, some of which have been attending Farm to Fork since its start in 2016, and the addition of six new business. The event also welcomed the new addition of themed Creation Stations sponsored by Community Bank featuring five celebrity stars and five 4-H youth participants. A public favorite being Gilligan's who joined the Creation Stations for the third year, handing out dishes of a variety of ice cream flavors.

Assemblyman Gary Finch, Local District FFA President Taylor Moore, and others, joined in the celebration of agriculture on Friday at the Community Bank Creation Stations. Fair goers were given the opportunity to taste milk shakes, zucchini pizzas, and blueberry maple smoothies, to name a few. 4-H youth continued the excitement on Saturday cooking their favorite recipes at these stations as a part of a program where they have learned to grow and cook their own food. The youth did a great job talking about their culinary treats as they were prepared for the fair audience.

A video recap of Farm to Fork was created and posted to YouTube and Facebook for those that could not attend, it obtained 91 views in one month and continues to reach a wider audience.














2018 ITTA Program

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County hosted the VITA program in their off hours again for the fifteenth year in a row. The Chenango and Madison Creating Assets, Savings, and Hope (CASH) Coalition organizes volunteers and locations to host the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program. This program is designed to support free tax preparation services for low to moderate income individuals, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and limited English speakers, those that earn less than \$54,000 in a tax year. Each volunteer in this program is an IRS trained and certified tax preparer.

In Madison and Chenango counties, NBT Bank ensures the program is available for residents. Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County aids this program by opening its doors and lending space for the VITA Program. In the months of January to April, the office becomes very busy place for these tax returns. In 2018, volunteers in Chenango and Madison county completed 773 tax returns, totaling \$2,316,507 in refunds combined, In 2019 volunteers hope to expand those numbers and return more money than before.

On June 9th, youth put their survival skills to the test in fire starting, shelter building, kayaking, way-finding, and foraging challenges at Millbrook Park in New Berlin, competing to see which team had what it takes to survive in the wilderness. All of the participants exhibited excellent teamwork and survival skills. They walked away with headlamps, 4-H geocaching coins, outdoor ethics informational cards and

more to encourage their love for the outdoors!

We are grateful for not only the financial sponsorship from Kerry, but also the excellent volunteers who stepped forward and helped on the day of the event. We look forward to organizing the competition again next year!

Cornell Cooperative Extension in the Media

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County Staff use social media, websites, local papers, and the radio, to reach the public. In the 2018 year, Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County was in the Sherburne News Paper 42 times, the Evening Sun 140 times, the Pennysaver 48 times, the Oneonta Daily Star 12 times, and the Small Farms Quarterly four times. Also in various other papers in the region such as Country Folks East and Empire Farm and Dairy. The association was also on the radio on 4 different occasions for the promotion of programs and events.

One of the largest ways that we reach the public is through our social media pages. Chenango County 4-H and Cooperative Extension both have their own pages on Facebook. These pages are used to share programs, events, and important information with all the 449 followers of Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County page and the 481 followers of Chenango County 4-H page. One of the biggest editions to these Facebook pages have been the association videos created, which have also been uploaded to YouTube.

In the last year, 11 videos were been created and uploaded to Facebook and YouTube, and now have over 26,000 views in total. These videos range in topic and were made for varying grants and events. Our webpage is also a great platform for staff to share program opportunities and events, over the last year there was 5.3K views tracked, a 19.4% increase from last year. The webpage was most active in August, and gets the most views on the 4-H landing page. Besides the webpage and social media, the association also disseminates 6 newsletters a year to about 2,000 people, giving them program updates, upcoming events, and great images of all that's going on at Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County!

Chenango County Staff also answers phone calls and talks to visitors in the office on a daily basis. This direct form of communication is very important to the presence of Cornell Cooperative Extension in Chenango County.
