

5 Minute Ice Cream In A Bag

A fun activity for the whole family, this easy ice cream is a synch to whip up & a refreshing science experiment. Cook Time5 mins Total Time5 mins Course: Dessert Cuisine: American Servings: 1 Calories: 132.38kcal

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup whole milk half and half, or cream
- 1 tbsp sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 6 tbsp sea salt
- 2 cups of ice
- sandwich sized ziplock bag
- quart sized ziplock bag



Instructions

- 1. In the sandwich sized ziplocking bag, add milk, sugar, and vanilla. Seal bag tightly.
- 2. In the quart sized bag, add the ice and salt.
- 3. Place the smaller bag inside the larger bag and seal tightly.
- 4. Shake the bag as hard as you can, without popping it open, for 5 minutes or until it reaches the consistency of ice cream.
- Remove the smaller bag and give it a quick rinse to remove any pieces of salt. Make sure you rinse the opening as well.
- 6. Open the ice cream and eat it straight out of the bag with a spoon.

Borax Snowflakes

What you'll need:

Borax laundry detergent booster

Water String Scissors Measuring cup Empty container Food coloring (optional) Popsicle stick or pencil Pipe cleaners (Get a variety pack for some awesome bright colors)

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Directions:

- Step 1. Shape your pipe cleaners into snowflakes. You can be as creative as you want here but simple is lovely too. Keep in mind here to not make your snowflake wider than your container.
- Step 2. Use the string to tie your snowflakes and stick/pencil together. Make the string long enough to fully submerge your snowflake in the Borax.
- Step 3. Mix your Borax with boiling water. 1/3 cup of Borax to 2 cups of boiling water. Stir until the Borax has dissolved. To add color to the crystals you can add 15-25 drops of food coloring here. I've always wanted to try adding glitter to the mix but I haven't yet. If you give it a try come back and let me know how it goes!
- Step 4. Submerge your snowflake in the Borax solution, resting the stick across the top of the container. Adjust string if needed to keep snowflake in the center of the container and not touching any side.
- Step 5. Place in a location where it won't be disturbed and carry on with your day.
- Step 6. The next morning come back and you will have beautiful borax snowflakes! Hang them and ENJOY!

* To grow a second snowflake from the same solution, and trust me, you'll want to, simply reheat the solution directly in the container in the microwave until all of the borax has re-dissolved {around 4-6 minutes}. Then, repeat the steps above.

Possible Substitutions

Since Borax can be a dangerous substance to ingest, you can use alternatives to form the crystals. Salt or sugar will work just as well. One thing you do need to know is that a salt or sugar solution (prepared at the same ratio) will take MUCH longer. So if you try these versions be patient and prepared for up to a week to grow the crystals.



Fun activities and interesting facts to help make those winter days less blue.

According to the National Oceanic and
Atmospheric Administration, snowflakes begin
to form when an extremely cold water droplet
freezes onto a pollen or dust particle in the sky.
This creates an ice crystal. As the ice crystal falls
to the ground, water vapor freezes onto the
primary crystal, building new crystals – the six
arms of the snowflake.
No two snowflakes appear to look-alike because
each individual snowflake follows a slightly
different path from the sky to the ground
{encountering different atmospheric conditions

along the way}. Snowflakes can resemble everything from prisms and needles to the familiar lace pattern.



So what is it about snowflakes that fascinate us? Is it their shape? Their beauty? The way they appear as they're falling from the sky? Or do we feel a connection to snowflakes because no two are alike—just like us?
