4-H Support Needed

For many years Chenango County 4-H has borrowed Chicken Cages that are difficult to sanitize and keep in good repair. It is time to provide better biosecurity for our poultry. - A letter from Janet Pfromm, 4-H Coordinator

Thank you very much for your continued support of your local, state, and National 4-H Programs. Your generosity has helped shaped the lives of millions of youth both here in Chenango County and across this country!

The Chenango County 4-H Program is currently holding a campaign to raise funds to purchase a set of poultry cages for our 25 youth

who participate in the 4-H Poultry Program. These youth annually exhibit an average of 300 birds of all shapes and sizes at the Chenango County Fair each year. Our 4-H Program borrows a neighboring county's cages each year to exhibit birds during the week of fair. While this has been a good partnership over the years, we find it increasingly difficult to receive the cages in good shape, i.e. clean,

corresponding to our entries. Cages are usually used continuously over a 3 week period (3 county fairs) with little chance of proper cleaning/disinfecting and maintenance. In an effort to provide better biosecurity to our 4-H members and their flocks, we would like to ask for your support in purchasing this much needed equipment (and crossing our fingers that 4-H poultry shows will resume in 2016!). We are

working with Keipper Cooping Company in Wisconsin to fabricate cages to our needs. The total cost for cages for 300 small and large birds, with shipping, is \$4,000.00.

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April 15: The Taxman Comes!

As you read this in January, the winds and snow will be howling outside your windows, and as you curl up in front of the fireplace, the last thing that you want to think about is preparing your 2015 income tax return. However, as the old saying goes, death and taxes are about the only sure things in life. People frequently have questions about lowering the tax liabilities in their businesses. The three main tax lowering strategies are:

- 1. The agricultural sales tax exemption.
- 2. The agricultural income tax reduction.
- 3. Farmland reduction of real property tax.

The Sales Tax Exemption

Certain items which are purchased for use in a farm business can be exempt from paying sales taxes. How does one become a farm business? One must file for a business name certificate, otherwise known as a "doing business as" certificate, or "dba". You will be required to file for an "EIN", or Employee Identification Number, which can be done online or by phone. When this is accomplished, you must sign the required forms with each vendor or business from which you purchase supplies. You should consult with your accountant, in preparation of certificates as important legal consequences are involved.

Income Tax Reductions

To reduce your income tax liabilities, you need to file a "Schedule F, Form 1040" with the rest of your income tax forms, which is "Profit or Loss From Farming". This is where the services of a farm oriented tax accountant can be invaluable. Meticulous records need to be kept throughout the year, in the case of a possible audit by the IRS. Copies of all receipts and disbursements need to be kept on hand in order to back up your Income Tax Statements. Expenses which have been legitimately garnered in the course of conducting your business can be deducted from your gross income and thus lowering your income tax liability.

Property Tax Reductions

The NY Agricultural Districts Law provides for reduced property tax bills for land in agricultural production by limiting the assessment of such land to its prescribed agricultural assessment value. Owners whose land satisfies the eligibility requirements may apply for an agricultural assessment, which can lower, but not eliminate your property taxes. The landowner must file an application (form RP-305 or RP-305-r) with your local town tax assessor, and which must be done annually, typically by March. The farmland must satisfy certain gross sales and acreage eligibility requirements. Land generally must consist of seven or more acres that were used in the preceding two years for the production for sale of crops, livestock, or livestock products. The annual gross sales of products must average \$10,000 or more for the preceding two years. Farmlands that are not already in an established agricultural district may be eligible for this program as well.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR VITA PROGRAM

With tax season quickly approaching, the CASH (Creating Assets Savings and Hope) Coalition of Chenango and Madison Counties is looking for volunteers to participate in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program to become IRS-trained and certified tax preparers for families who earned less

than \$54,000 this tax year. No prior experience is necessary and training and testing may be completed online.

Volunteers will receive training to provide free tax help for low-to-moderate income families who need assistance preparing their tax returns. The volunteer sites are located at locations throughout both counties and the hours are flexible.

Many people will qualify for this free program for the first time this year due to economic changes in their income or changes in their marital or parental status according to the IRS. The agency estimates four out of five eligible workers currently claim their Earned Income Tax Credit. In 2014 hundreds of families/individuals took advantage of this program and had their income taxes prepared by the IRS-certified volunteers. In Chenango and Madison counties \$1.67 million were returned.

Evening and weekend appointments will be available Thursdays and Saturdays, January through March at locations throughout Chenango and Madison counties for those individuals needing assistance.

Grow Cook Eat Program Graduates Fourth Class and Recruits for Next Session

The Grow Cook Eat program graduated its fourth class on December 1, 2015. 14 individuals completed the program and celebrated their accomplishments with dinner at the Bohemian Moon with staff and volunteer instructors. This Chenango United Way funded program was designed to give participants an integrated and holistic program so that the whole experience would be greater than the sum of its parts.

Each participant was provided with a community garden plot, container garden or support for gardening in their own yard. Requirements for graduation included taking 5 gardening classes, 6 Eat Smart New York (ESNY) cooking and nutrition classes, 3 food preservation classes, 3 YMCA physical fitness classes or group activities, personal goal setting and evaluation sessions,

and completing 10 hours of volunteer work in the community including the Chenango United Way Day of Caring event. Several participants exceeded these goals and three participants took a total of 22 classes during the year!

Regina Pylinski said, "I learned so much new stuff. I loved the class interaction. There was such a great variety of information and participants. It is a wonderful program, and it is offered so close to where I live!"

Participants reported that they were eating healthier by using produce from their gardens, shopping at the farmers market or farm stands and using healthier recipes from ESNY or the internet. Many reported increased physical activity through gardening, YMCA classes and walking. They were also using coupons and saving money by checking sales and preparing a shopping list. And they are modeling these behaviors to their families, coworkers and students or clients.

Cindy Warner described the program as follows; "Grow, Cook, Eat is a "hands on learning" program taught by knowledgeable instructors. I gained the skills to garden successfully, preserve the harvest, and also made healthy lifestyle adjustments. I'm very grateful I had the opportunity to participate!"

Grow Cook Eat will begin recruiting participants for the 2016 program immediately as the program has secured multiple-year funding through 2017.

"We are looking for a diverse group of adults to participate in the program again this year. We want to attract people of different ages, income levels, education levels, and people with various levels of experience and skills in gardening, cooking and food preservation," said Stacie Edick.

Grow Cook SERVE Finishes First Year

The new Grow Cook Serve program finished its first year. This Chenango United Way funded program is designed to increase the capacity of food pantries and soup kitchens in Chenango County by recruiting and training volunteers to grow or glean fresh produce for donation to food pantries and soup kitchens and to have participant volunteers staff food pantries and soup kitchens. So far 11 Participant Volunteers have provided 178 hours of volunteer service to growing crops, gleaning fresh produce, delivering to and staffing food pantries and soup kitchens. The program has donated 828 pounds of produce including 24 pounds of frozen corn and 55 pounds of frozen squash processed in the CCE Kitchen under Grow Cook Serve's 20C Food Processing License. In February we will know if the program has been funded again for 2016. The New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets, New York Farm Bureau (NYFB) and New York Center for Agricultural Medicine and Health (NYCAMH) joined together at Turning Point Farm in Saratoga Springs Monday, Dec. 14, to announce the establishment of a fund to help New York farmers enhance safety on the farm.

"We're excited to integrate this program into the portfolio of health and safety services we offer to the agricultural community," said NYCAMH's Director, Julie Sorensen. The John May Safety Fund fills a gap in services to small farms, where slim profit margins often make it difficult to do more than what is needed to keep the farm running every day".

The Safety Fund set up by NYCAMH honors the organization's co-founder and long-time director Dr. John May and will assist New York farmers who need financial help improving safety on their farms. As the first program of its kind in New York State, this cost sharing program will allow farmers to make lifesaving safety upgrades.

New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets Commissioner Richard A. Ball said, "With the continued growth of the agricultural industry and our efforts to encourage the next generation of farmers, it's even more important than ever that we support farm safety programs like the John May Safety Fund. It is our hope that this grant fund administered by NYCAMH will bring attention to the importance of much needed safety projects and upgrades, and we encourage the agricultural community to take advantage of these newly available resources."

The new program announced by NYCAMH will become available beginning in January of 2016 to the state's farmers who meet the application guidelines. The program will be geared towards smaller farms of all commodities. Applications to the program may be submitted at any time and may be obtained online at www.nycamh.org, by calling NYCAMH at (800) 343-7527 or emailing info@nycamh.org. The number of awards and the award amount will be determined by NYCAMH on a first-come, first-served basis. "NYCAMH provides an essential service for farms across New York. The efforts to improve safety and working conditions for both farmers and their employees has, no doubt, saved lives and reduced the number of injuries. New York Farm Bureau is a strong supporter of NYCAMH's work and is hopeful our members will take advantage of the new grant program to make farms in this state even better places to work," said Steve Ammerman, New York Farm Bureau Manager of Public Affairs.

Since it's founding in the early 1980's, NYCAMH has established a farmer's clinic to help diagnose and treat farm related injuries and illnesses, developed a NYS ROPS Rebate Program that has retrofitted over 1,400 tractors, and performed hundreds of on-farm safety trainings to thousands of farm workers.


In 1985, the event became the Eastern National 4-H Horse Roundup and moved to the North American International Livestock Exposition in Louisville, Kentucky, and a 4-H Hippology Contest was added. The North American and Commonwealth of Kentucky offers outstanding facilities, support and a quality of horses to make this an outstanding program with unlimited potential. Donations from industry businesses, individuals and associations have been instrumental in funding the Eastern National 4-H Horse Roundup. Without their support, along with that of the North American International Livestock Exposition, the Roundup would not be possible.

The Roundup is the final educational-competition event for hundreds of 4-H members from all over the nation. All are state winners and proudly represent their state in this exciting, educational and competitive program. 4-H Incubation & Embryology Program


