# **SNAP-Ed Busy with Programmin**

#### **Impact Report**

Chenango County is served by the regional SNAP-Ed team who includes: Whitney Kmetz, Community Health & Nutrition Supervisor; Carrie Forward & Carol Lyons, SNAP-Ed Nutrition Educators. Our region covers Chenango, Madison, and Cortland County. SNAP-Ed teaches individuals from 1st grade through older adults how to shop and cook healthy meals on a budget!

SNAP-Ed has created lasting community partnerships to create positive change within our county. We were awarded a full season standard share of vegetables saving our program \$1014.42 this year, using about 15 pounds of produce weekly and 330 pounds overall. We are so grateful for their continued support.

One thing that makes our job worth it is the positive successes that happen. Here are some highlights... At Chase memorial, they have added the SNAP-Ed recipe, Zucchini Blueberry Pancakes to their menu. Many participants have tried new recipes such as, Northwest Apple Salad, Unbeetable Berry Smoothie, Popyeye Power Smoothie and more.

We have created added value to our programming by collaborating with other CCE Educators. Ag in the Classroom Educator, Shealyn Otto and Community Health & Nutrition Supervisor, Whitney Kmetz provided a lesson during Ag literacy week, Shealyn did a wonderful strawberry lesson. Then Whitney provided a lesson on the importance of fruits and vegetables and prepared a strawberry spinach salad recipe. The students LOVED this lesson, and we even received an email from Oxford Central School District about how much the kids loved it!

Another great effort was made by Grow, Cook, Serve Coordinator Alexis Woodcock and Community Health & Nutrition Supervisor, Whitney Kmetz where they incorporated two programs into one flawlessly with growing, cooking, and serving healthy foods on a budget during this past fiscal year. One participant said "I really look forward to these classes. It is eating so differently than how I have the other 66 years".

On October 26th at 2pm, Southern Tier Region SNAP-Ed Team Regina Arnold and Whitney Kmetz, won the "Big Apple Crunch" event at our PSE school, During this event, it was about 300 individuals that participated to make this come to life! The event takes place on this day for New York to celebrate the apple harvest, appreciate eating local, and to inspire everyone to "crunch" on apples through FarmOn! This district took it above and beyond, all of the elementary students and staff wore yellow, red, or green for the event. We were able to do it outside since the weather was perfect that day, actually a bit too warm because the bees loved the apples! There were cones set up outside and everyone stood around the perimeter of the cones, it was in a formation of an apple! Above was a drove flown by the art teacher in the elementary school who was taking pictures of this event for us. Whitney Kmetz, our Community Health & Nutrition Supervisor sent the pictures to FarmOn! after the event through Facebook, Instagram, and their actual email contact. It took a few days then we were notified that we won for the State!! This win meant that FarmOn! provided the elementary school \$1,000 for a victory garden.

# Agriculture, Grazing, and Ag Economic Development

### 2024 Highlights:







Throughout the 2023-2024 programming year, agriculture played an important role in our work at Chenango County Cooperative Extension. As part of our daily service to Chenango County we are able to give assistance to clients through several means: phone calls, emails, and assistance to our walk in clients. Some of the highlights from this year:

- Dairy Day was held in June at the Chenango County Fairgrounds.
- We have provided information on property tax reduction, soil testing, timber sales, and enterprises for new beginning farmers.
- Took part at the Grasstravaganza Grazing Conference in March, held at Morrisville College. Approximately 1090 in attendance.
- We have collaborated in several initiatives of the Cornell Small Farms Program: Beginning Farmer support, informational articles written for the Small Farms Quarterly about grazing and beef cattle (readership is about 8,000).
- Teamed up with Nicole Tommel on the "Baskets to Pallets" online workshop to assist producers with wholesale marketing.
- CCE Chenango was represented at the Central NY Dairy Day in Cooperstown sponsored by the NY Dairy, Livestock, and Field Crops team.
- Assist Amish Farmers planning to convert a bedded pack dairy barn into a free stall barn set up.
- Rich Taber served as a judge at the Central NY Regional Envirothon in Sherburne.
- Two-day workshop at Cornell's Arnot Forest, FRESH, Forest Resource Extension Sharing.
- In July, another team effort with Daniella Carranza Gonales, hosting a two-day workshop on artificial insemination of beef and dairy cattle. Twelve were in attendance.
- Collaboration has been provided in support of Commerce Chenango, the Agriculture Development Council, the Ag and Farmland Protection Committee, Dairy Day, Farm Bureau, and the Chenango County Fair.
- In September a meeting was held for vendors that were interested in starting up a summer and winter farmers market. CCE gave support by advising those interested in the Norwich farmers market start up.

### 2024 VALUABLE PROGRAMS IN OUR COMMUNTIY

#### **2024 VITA PROGRAM**



In 2024, Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chenango County once again opened their doors for the twenty-second year in a row by lending space and becoming a busy site for the VITA program, as volunteer's aid residents with their taxes. The Chenango and Madison Creating Assets, Savings, and Hope (CASH) Coalition sets up volunteers to assist people, organizes volunteers, and locations to assist people filing their tax returns. The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program is designed to support free tax preparation services for low to moderate income individuals, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and limited English speakers, those that earn less than \$67,000 in a tax year. Each volunteer in this program is an IRS trained and certified tax preparer.

In Madison and Chenango counties, NBT Bank ensures the program is available for residents. In the months of January to April, the office becomes a very busy place for these tax returns. In 2024, volunteers in Chenango County completed 400 tax returns, a huge increase since its onset of 50 returns in 2004. In 2025 volunteers hope to expand these numbers and return more money to local residents than in years before.

#### **MASTER GARDENER VOLUNTEERS**

The Master Gardener Volunteers held seven meetings throughout 2024, with four of those including additional hours spent working on the gardens at the Nowich Guernsey Library or at the CCE offices. We weeded, mulched, planted, and trimmed flowers and shrubs in the half circle garden at the Library in April and October.



In May then again in October we cleared some of the vegetation from the front of the CCE building and planted Hostas along the edge of the building in the spring, cut down dead material, trimmed shrubs and trees at the side of the CCE garden. This was done with the goal of reducing the size and plant composition of that space for reasons of security as well as simplicity. When the CCE office receives home garden related enquiries, as part of what used to be the MGV Hotline, they are forwarded via email to us, we then research and supply answers to the questioner via email or by telephone.

With just four to six active members attending our meetings, we do not have the personpower to provide physical assistance with planting or maintaining garden projects for local organizations that occasionally request our advice and assistance and feel it is important to inctease community interest and participation in the Master Gardener Program. In August, flyers about the upcoming MGV training were shared at the Chenango County Fair and we will continue to explore other ways to contact and inform the public. We hope to become increasingly involved in the Norwich Community Garden plots in 2025.

We believe participation in the MGV program has increased our knowledge and understanding of gardening principles and methods, giving us valuable connections to our community and to each other. We want to thank the staff at CCE for their very helpful support for what we do.

#### **HOME BUREAU**



The New York State Federation of Home Bureau was founded by womens leaders of various organizations in 1919 in Ithaca, NY. The organization consists of NYS homemakers, both urban and rutal, non-political, non-sectarian, and non-racial. It is an independent organization, solely supported by membership dues.

There are six project areas to Home Bureau: Consumer Education, Legislation, Crafts, Health and Safety, Scholarship, and Community Service.

The Chenango County chapter meet every Wednesday morning at the CCE building. This group has done some pretty amazing things. Some examples that they have contributed back into communities are: making items for nursing homes, scarfs and hats for cancer patients, huggy bears for children in hospitals, sending items to our military men and women, making lap blankets, creating treats for nursing home patients, and so much more. This organization believes that our community is very important so they are always looking for ways to give back to our communities. Many hours are spent in dong community service by the members.

### EFNEP - Expanded Food & Nutrition Education Program



#### EFNEP Program is NEW to CCE Chenango County!

EFNEP (Expanded Food & Nutrition Education Program) is a free nutrition education program helping families and individuals eat healthier, be more active, save money when buying food, explore ideas for feeding children and keeping food safe. Our eligibility requirements are youth grades 3-12, parents/guardians, kinship caregiver and or youth adults (18-25). These participants must live in Chenango County and participate in any of the following: SNAP, WIC, Medicaid, Head Start, Free and Reduced-price school meals, and any other limited resource benefits. Each participant/family is enrolled in an 8-week, 60–120-minute interactive, small group, hands-on training class leading to a Certificate of Completion from Cornell University. ## Grow Cook Serve

Grow Cook Serve is a program designed to create a healthier and more vibrant Chenango County by ensuring all residents have access to nutritious food. Through engaging cooking classes, hands-on gardening education, and generous produce donations, we aim to empower our community with the knowledge and resources needed to lead healthy, sustainable lives. By fostering strong community engagement and collaboration, and partnering with local farmers, we strive to build a supportive network where everyone can contribute to and benefit from a culture of wellness and shared growth. In its ninth year, Grow Cook Serve gleaned over 4000 pounds of fresh produce to donate to 7 Food Pantries in Chenango County. The produce was donated by Norwich Meadows Farm, and home gardeners. Additionally, Grow Cook Serve donated over 100 vegetable transplants and 300 packets of vegetable seeds.

As part of a new collaboration Grow Cook Serve offers adult workshops once a month at the Chenango Family Food CO-OP. This partnership is a way to introduce community members to the Food CO-OP as well as offer an opportunity for more adult education. Workshop topics included: Planning your Garden and Seed Starting, Introduction to Whole Grain Bread Baking, Food Preservation Safety and Science, Starting a Sourdough Starter, Introduction to Pasta Making, and many more.

As a continuing partnership, Grow Cook Serve hosted seven adult workshops with Head Start Families. The topics included: Container Gardening, Freezing and Dehydrating, Solutions for Picky Eaters, Planning your Garden, Seed Starting, and Holiday Baking. Head Start supplied families with gardening gloves, trowels, and a garden caddie to keep their tools in. Grow Cook Serve gave families planting containers, transplants and soil. Each family planted a few containers with tomatoes, peppers, and herbs. As part of a grant secured by the Rural Health Network, Early Head Start families receive a CSA share every two weeks over the summer. The shares are supplied by the Catskill Agrarian Alliance and picked up at the CCE building. On pickup days Grow Cook Serve offers a cooking workshop, plus tips and tricks on how to use the produce included in their shares.

Grow Cook Serve along with the Department of Public Health and Afton/Bainbridge Libraries has been offering Lead Poisoning Prevention information sessions. Neisa Pantalia of Public Health read a children's book about protecting ourselves from lead poisoning and discussed with parents' strategies to keep lead out of the home. Grow Cook Serve made a snap-pea salad for a snack and all families did a planting activity.

Grow Cook Serve is continuing to support the Norwich Middle School Garden Club. The students spent much of the Spring preparing the garden beds and planting vegetables for the summer. The summer weekly sessions saw students harvesting and cooking their bounty. Once school started the students worked hard to put the gardens to bed and prepare for the winter. The crops the students were most excited about were strawberries, asparagus, and peanuts. They all really enjoyed roasting their own peanuts and eating them as a snack after school.

SNAP-ED and Grow Cook Serve joined forces again in 2024 to offer a Healthy Living Series of classes. The goal of the workshops is to provide a fun way for adults to learn about how to make healthy choices easier every day. We provide a short lecture, have a hands-on cooking demonstration, and then share a meal together. We have hosted 7 workshops. As part of a growing adult education program Grow Cook Serve offered a Fall Bread Baking Series. The series included Introduction to Bread Baking, Flat Breads, Pizza and Focaccia, Baking with Whole Grains, and Baking Holiday Breads.

Every year Grow Cook Serve continues to evolve and adapt by adding new partnerships and collaborations. We look forward to serving the community of Chenango County in 2025.

#### **A YEAR IN REVIEW** ANIMAL SCIENCE AND AGRICULTURE

- **County Fair** had immense growth in several species: in 2024 we had 50 sheep, 10 dogs, 189 poultry, 30 meat goats, 6 swine, 64 dairy goats, and 130 head of cattle entered
- Top Showman Honors at Cooperstown Jr Livestock Show and NYS Fair in Dairy Cattle and Dairy Goats
- Widely successful sheep clinic proving with support youth are unstoppable
- 24 youth participated in **Dairy Bowl** practices this year, 13 of them competing at the regional contest. Our teams placed 3rd in beginner and 4th in the junior team competitions. We also took home 10th place, 8th, 3rd, 2nd beginner individual placings and 8th and 3rd place individual junior placings.
- 19 youth met weekly over the course of 3 months learning all about **Equine science**, 11 youth moved on to the regional contest where the junior team placed 3rd overall with Maria F, earning a 1st individual placing. Our mixed region 4 group of seniors placed 5th overall.



• 14 youth participated in **Livestock Skill-A-Thon** Practices. 7 competing in the FIRST ever regional contest where we had the 2nd place beginner team!

## More Chenango County 4-H 2024 Year in Review

The Kids in the Kitchen program continued to flourish in its fourth year. The goal of this program is to teach children how to create healthy inexpensive meals. Families pick up their meal kits and cook along with Grow Cook Serve educators virtually. We hosted 8 classes.

Along with Kids in the Kitchen, Grow Cook Serve, held 3 Kids in the Garden Workshops to teach 4-H'ers how to grow their own vegetables at home. Additionally, participants learn how gardening can contribute to physical and mental wellbeing.







Another first in the 4-H programming was an Animal First Aid clinic. This took place at the CCE building where 15 families took part in the program. Each family took home a first aid kit from the event.



4-H Clubs and Families performed over 25 community services projects taking place throughout the year, with an average length of 3 hours per service.





4-h'ers got together to try their hand at a fun painting barn quilt project. They took blank canvas' and worked on their own barn quilt designs.

A new program was offered to our 4-H'ers in 2024 which was a babysitting class. This was offered by the American Red Cross to help train our youth with the skills for babysitting. Eight youth participated in this program.

The 4-H Communication program has been an integral part of Chenango County 4-H for many years. Thirty 4-H'ers came to give their presentations to a group of volunteer judges. Everyone did an amazing job, with a variety of fantasitc topics. Chenango County had eleven youth go on to compete at the regional level as well as three equine presenters that went on to compete at the NYS competition.











Another incredible year for the 2024 sewing program. This program serves 4-H youth ages 5to 14-year-olds. This year we engaged 40 youth contacts with the help of 22 amazing volunteers. These volunteers gave a total of 250 hours of their time to help our 4-H youth accomplish some amazing projects. Throughout the sewing program we strive to teach not just the basics of sewing machine use and safety, but different aspects needed for successful sewing. We talk about types of needles, varied bobbins, threads, fabrics, and a whole lot more. On one evening we had two clubs join the sewing program wanting a sewing lesson, at this meeting we were able to cover four different types of hand sewn stitches. We continue to have many youth interested in learning to sew.

Our sewing program ended on May 8th to acknowledge all of the 4-H'ers sewing achievements. The Sewing Spectacular was a fun way for the kids to show off their projects to parents, grandparents, leaders, and friends as they walk across the stage at the Chenango County Council of the Arts.

### A Great Year with 4-H Shooting Sports!



Chenango County 4-H Shooting continues to grow. In 2024 we had 28 youth participate, (14 Girls and 14 Boys). This growth brought about changes in our schedule in order to accomodate all participants.

The air rifle and .22 programs are working on standing, prone, and kneeling positions. Each of these positions require a different focus for safety and accuracy. Our 4-H'ers have worked hard to learn these new skills.

The archery program has added an additional 10 yards to their program requiring youth to learn how to change their technique in order to allow continued accurracy at these distances.

Last year we had 5 instructors. We have new volunteers that are looking forward to taking their instructor training in February 2025. Our instructors and volunteers continued to work on firearm and markmanship skills. A big thank you to Rockdale Rod and Gun Club for supporting us with facility space!



#### Creative Cooking with 4-H Outdoor Cooking!

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The Chenango 4-H Outdoor Cooking program continues to create delicious recipes made using cast iron Dutch Ovens over charcoal. The youth in this program have become pretty creative, they make everything from scratch and discuss their dishes after to see what could be improved or changed. They are allowed to experiment with different amounts of ingredients, altering their dishes to suit what they think would be good. It is a wonderful opportunity for these young people to create food that is solely made by themselves. Throughout 2024 they have used their skills with main dishes, desserts, and breads all in cast iron over charcoal.

The program met with 8 youth and consists of youth ages 12 and older. During 2024, we had 4 boys and 4 girls in attendance. We met once a month, year round, through rain and snow, unless the weather was really bad.

Toward the end of the season the youth are given a challenge to come up with recipes on their own, to create something that they would like to share. Once they plan their end of the year dishes they set up shop during the Chenango County fair, where these 4-H'ers demonstrated and provided samples to the fair goers. In 2024, it was their second year demonstrating at the fair. This was a huge success and you would never go hungry with these 4-H'ers around. This program is fortunate to have three 4-H volunteers giving them guidance as they learn these culinary outdoor cooking skills.
