FARM TO FORK

Farm to Fork, a Taste of Chenango, was held for its fifth year at the fair on Saturday. The event was open to the public at the Chenango County Fair and offered fairgoers an experience of local agricultural products and flavors. This year's event was smaller than years past but offered up a lot of variety that the county has to offer. At the Creation Stations Joe Cornell brought a choice of two different dips to go with two varieties of potatoes he grows, Chobani served coffee and creamers, Cameron Cates Estate created sauteed mushrooms in his estate wine, Alexis Woodcock with Grow Cook Serve created caramelized shallot crostini, and 4H members Logan and Hunter McBride used their Dutch oven skills to create pizza and blueberry dump cake.

New to this year was the Can you taste the difference? table where Kutik's Honey offered up a large spread of various honey flavors, SUNY Morrisville brought sauces from their agricultural business student projects, Dairy Promotion served up a variety of cheeses and milks, Lamb's Quarter offered up goat butter and cows butter and finally a sampling of maple syrup.

The event was sponsored by the Agriculture Natural Resource Development Council and CCE Chenango as a way to promote local food based agricultural products. Chenango county is full of various roadside stands and small to large businesses that sell in season items like corn, potatoes, garlic, tomatoes and pumpkins. The display along with the samplings focused on a map including many of the places you can shop and support local farms. Highlighted on the map were over 50 local vendors along with over a dozen farmers' markets found throughout the county. The hope is to showcase buying local and the large variety of produce and products Chenango County has to offer. If you missed Farm to Fork this year be sure to look for it next year at the fair!

This year's SNAP-Ed New York's School Wellness Summer Symposium was a dynamic event held on August 9 - 11, 2022 and was designed to bring together (virtually) school staff and administration from across NY to inspire, educate and engage. Through live virtual activities, participants gained knowledge, skills, and abilities to start, strengthen and/or expand school wellness efforts for staff, students and families. Chenango County's SNAP-Ed Team Leader Betty Clark and her technical support/ Nutritionist Whitney Kmetz brought together school champions to share their experiences working with SNAP-Ed Nutritionist and the CATCH curriculum. On Wednesday, August 10th at 10am guest speakers Kaleigh Bowles, fifth grade teacher from the Monticello Central District along with Bryan Fairbrother, Elementary Principal and Susan Osborne, Physical Education Teacher and CATCH Team Leader both from Edward R. Andrews Elementary School shared experiences from single classroom CATCH lessons to a CATCH Training followed by food Tastings, Water Wednesdays, whole school classroom lessons and a school-wide Wellness Day event. The session was titled "Ready to Play CATCH? Taking you on a Coordinated Approach to Childhood Health Journey."

CATCH Team Leader Sue Osborne has been a true inspiration to all her colleagues at Edward R. Andrews Elementary in Morrisville, New York. Sue's dedication to creating a healthy school environment has gone viral among the students, teachers, administrators, and support staff at the school. Bryan Fairbrother, Principal at the school shared how he feels the whole school approach is the reason why CATCH has been so successful at Edward R. Andrews.

While Kaleigh's experience and determination has led to a great repertoire with Cornell Cooperative Extension and SNAP-Ed Nutritionists, she hopes that through the knowledge gained from the session, more schools including her own will see how dynamic CATCH can be and will take the steps to provide a "Whole School" CATCH Training in the upcoming 2022-2023 school year.

CCE of Chenango County's SNAP-Ed team has been working at Edward R. Andrews with CATCH since 2017 when the school hosted the training. SNAP-Ed Nutritionist, Neisa Pantalia and Team Leader, Betty Clark have done many food tastings, infused water for "Water Wednesdays" along with both in-person and recorded CATCH lessons for students in grades 1st-5th. In the Spring during their monthly CATCH PLC Team meeting, committee members discussed having a wellness day event dedicated to overall wellness for students. On May 18th, 2022, with the collaborated efforts of students and the entire staff the very first Wellness Day event went off without a hitch. It goes without saying that CATCH has made a significant impact in the school community at Edward R. Andrews.

2022: LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS DEALING WITH DROUGHT!

I have lived in Central New York for 43 years and do not remember a drought year as bad as this one! Yes, we've had a few drier than normal summers, but nothing like this year. The summer of 2021 was exactly the opposite! Last summer hayfields lay unmown for much of the summer because of the constant on and off rain that we had, and hay quality suffered for that. However, at least the pastures grew very well! The normal summer slump in grass production that occurs almost every year was minimal. This year, however, grass growth has all but stopped completely! How should we contend with this calamity which many of us don't have a whole lot of experience dealing with?

First, let's consider hay for the winter. If you make hay for yourself, then I'm sure that your inventories are much less than last year at this time. First cutting seems to have been about normal, as the conditions in late May and June were not too catastrophic at that time. However, second and third cuttings of grasses are way down. Alfalfa seems to have done ok to an extent, but as mentioned, stands heavy in grasses have done very poorly. Whether you make your own hay, or buy it in, you need to be considering purchasing some this summer before the prices climb to high levels this winter. I see hay for sale frequently on social media for about the same prices as last year, so don't wait too long, as the prices have nowhere to go but up in the coming months! You might even consider selling a few animals to lower your feed needs but watch the markets carefully so that you don't take a bath on their prices! Much of the South, especially Texas, has been liquidating their herds because of an almost total lack of pastures and hay. Market prices will be in disarray for quite some time.

For grazing considerations, you may need to be feeding some of that precious winter feed to make up for grazing deficits. Resting intervals for paddocks will need to be increased drastically as well.

Some people have decided to brush hog some of their paddocks after the animals move through them, as the animals don't like to graze upon brown, dead, parched, weedy paddocks.

Another pet peeve that I have is that I see some animals grazing continuously grazed pastures right through the summer. Such pastures are a poor management strategy in the best of times, and in a drought year there is even less grass for the animals to graze. Remember, ruminants need to take in about 3% of their body weight daily on a dry matter basis to thrive. If this is what your pastures are like, then they animals need to be supplemented with extra feed. Good luck in the "year of the drought"!

74th Annual Junior Livestock show brings animals, kids to Farmers' Museum

For the first time in two years, The Farmers' Museum welcomed youth and families for the Junior Livestock Show, taking place at the museum just outside Cooperstown.



Amidst the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic, The Farmers' Museum modified the show the previous year, shortening it from a three-day event to one day. Show organizer Meg Preston said this year's was full of new participants from across Central New York.

Preston has worked for The Farmers' Museum for 25 years and has been in charge of the Junior Livestock Show for 20. She said that, over the last few years, there have been several difficulties with organizing the show as the pandemic put a damper on most community-organized events. The current rising gas prices also left farmers with tough decisions, one of them being whether they have the time and money to participate in the show. Although organizing the show has its challenges, Preston said there are many upsides to organizing the event. "It's just great to see how happy the kids and families are," she said. She also said she receives a lot of help from the community and from the 4-H volunteers and educators.

Local farms such as the Fairchild Family Farm and B & L showcased their animals including cows, goats, swine, and sheep. With more than 160 youth handlers and as many as 450 animals from across nine counties, the Junior Livestock Show is one of the biggest celebrations of youth agriculture and animal handling within the region, organizers said. Participants and families spoke about their preparation for the event, saying they worked hard to tend to their livestock and make sure that the animals are happy and healthy for the competition.

Two of the winners from the Dairy Goat Show Ring, Devon Fairchild from Fairchild Family Farms in Sherburne and Paige Warren from Cole Farms talked about hardships preparing for the show. Both winners said they have endured physical injuries, with Fairchild facing a torn muscle and Warren requiring surgery on her dominant arm.

Warren explained that preparing for the show with an injured arm made it difficult for her to perform physical tasks such as lifting and moving heavy objects, and that clipping her dairy goat for the competition also proved to be a challenge. Fairchild added that, although he faced physical hardships, another issue he came in contact with was the lack of doe kids available for him to prepare and select for the show.

Other participants and winners such as Molly Goblet-Schubert and Emma Slater also said they loved spending time and taking care of their animals, a common favored activity amongst competitors. Schubert and Slater both said they felt nervous upon entering the show, but once they were with their animals in the ring, anxiety transformed into excitement.

The show opened on Sunday, July 10, and will conclude Tuesday, July 12.

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
